Hello everyone

Well, the weather continues to be all mixed up and it's difficult to decide what to wear on any occasion, let's hope that now the clocks have sprung forward we are a little nearer to the warm and drier weather.

So here we are with our April Newsletter, April being the fourth month of the year in the modern Gregorian calendar, and was known as April or Aprilis in Old English from its Latin names, Aprilis or Aperit, meaning to open. *[I wonder whether that's where aperitif comes from as that refers to the opening or beginning of a meal.]*

The Romans considered the month to be sacred to the goddess Venus and suggested that it was originally her month. In Greek the month was known as Aphro which was considered to be short for the goddess Aphrodite.




The Anglo Saxons called the month *ēastre-monap*, and the Venerable Bede (8th century) said that this month *ēastre* is the root of the word Easter. He considered that it was named after *Ēostre* or *Ōstara*, a pre Christian Germanic goddess of the dawn and spring.

Easter itself originated as a pagan festival, the hare, bunny and egg all representing spring, new life, and new beginnings etc.




Easter Sunday this year falls on April 12th. Easter and the preceding Holy Week is a moveable festival which takes place in March or April. Maundy Thursday is when the Last Supper took place, and the day priests of many churches wash the feet of members of their congregation in memorial of this happening to Jesus. This is followed by Good Friday, the day Jesus was tortured and died on the cross at Calvary, followed by his body being wrapped in a shroud and placed in the tomb along with myrrh and other spices. Easter Sunday usually sees a Sunrise Service at 6am on the viewing area of the Epynt, however this has had to be cancelled for this year.

The Zodiac signs for April are Aries up to the 20th of the month, followed by Taurus.

 Aries the Ram is the first sign of the Zodiac, it is a fire sign and its ruling planet is Mars. Aries is an energetic sign, bubbly, courageous, confident, and passionate. They love to be first with everything and are more than capable of multi-tasking and taking the lead, often before thinking things through properly.

Coronavirus Covid 19

I'm sure that like me and thousands of other people all over the world you are concerned about this new strain of virus which is now taking over people's lives. This will have such a huge impact on everyone, and is a very stressful time for us all, particularly smaller businesses, self-employed people and charities, some of which might never recover.

As an organisation, LWCT is also affected, and whereas I intended to tell you all the exciting things about the LWCT Heart of Wales Coffee Club, I have to tell you that it is closed until further notice as from Tuesday March 17th.

I was also going to tell you about all the amazing plans local groups and halls had for the 75th Anniversary of VE Day, but this too is cancelled.

Our contract for school transport is now on hold because the schools were all closed as of March 20th, and our shoppa bus service has been suspended for the time being. We have also had notification that the Spring Fair at the Royal Welsh Showground has been cancelled, so we will not be required to set up our event recycling, which of course along with the school transport contract goes to subsidise our other services to local people.

Dave Brown, our MD has spoken with some local businesses that are happy for you to contact them, by phone or email, to place orders, which of course is good because many small businesses will not survive without our support at this time. So you can order take away food which will just need reheating, prescriptions and other medication, and groceries. Some shops may be able to deliver, but if they can't we will do our utmost best to get your order to you. By doing this you are also placing yourself at less risk than if you go to the shops or supermarket in person.

HOMELESS HOPE FOOT HEALTH

Homeless Hope was initially set up approximately 18 months ago following a 24 hr sleep out in Cardiff, where two of our volunteers treated a young guy who had trench foot. It was apparent that whilst there were services in place, there were issues with some seeking help early, due to many different reasons, so, the then

members of Homeless Hope decided to start a voluntary basic foot care service to the street.

The sessions have gone from strength to strength, and at each session, it is clear to see that our homeless communities are building up a trust with us. Our aims are to roll this service out across the UK and to help our homeless friends to better engage with existing services.

The group actively supports other homeless support groups in Newport, Swansea, soon to be Bristol and other parts of Wales. Our moto is to be kind and to treat people fairly.

Unfortunately the group have had to temporarily pause their services due to COVID 19, but they intend to recommence as soon as national guidance allows them too. In the meantime, you can find more information about this wonderful group of volunteers on their Homeless Hope Facebook page.

Normally the group are happy to accept donations such as pot noodles, cup a soups, biscuits, energy bars etc, warm/ waterproof ladies/gents clothing, underwear, pyjamas, (small/ medium sizes), waterproof footwear, holdalls and back packs, but due to being on pause and storage issues, we ask that if you have any surplus items that you may wish to donate, you do this once they have resumed normal service.

Homeless Hope are able to accept monetary donations, please contact them directly if you wish to do this and they can supply you with the details on how best to donate. Laura and I were invited to be on the PAVO stand at the Careers Festival at the Royal Welsh Showground on March 4th. PAVO had two stands one in each of the halls being used, and around 2,000 students from 15 schools, some as far away as

Newtown and Welshpool visited the event. The people on the two stands spoke to around 650 people, mainly students but some teaching staff too.

We were able to tell the pupils how valuable volunteering is to gain life experiences, show support for the local community, employers like to see community work on a CV and the Welsh Baccaulaureate, even at Foundation Level, require young people to do a minimum of 15 hours voluntary work.

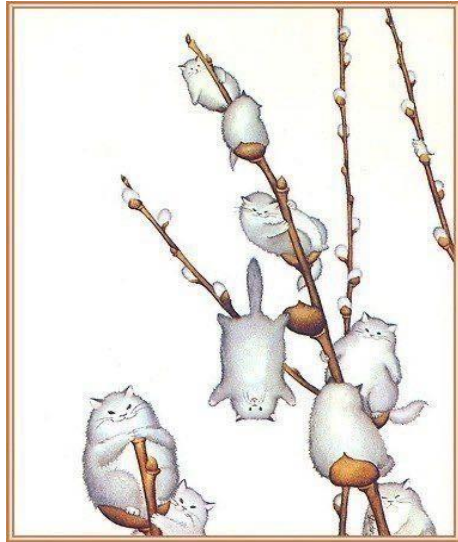


Rural Business Awards
