

Hi everyone

March 1st is Dewi Sant or St David's Day, the patron saint of Wales, and this national day has been celebrated as such since the 12th century. Apparently not much is known about St David except for a biography written by Rhygyfarch, the son of the Bishop of St David's Cathedral around 1090. As with all accounts which are so old, there are contradictions and an amount of speculation.

Although in medieval times it was thought that David was the nephew of King Arthur, his parents were descendants of Welsh Royalty, his father being Sandde, Prince of Powys, and his mother was Non, daughter of a chieftain of Menevia, now the little town of St David's. His birthplace (between 480 and 500 AD) was reputedly on a cliff top near Capel Non on the South-West coast of Wales.



David was educated at the monastery of Hen Fynyw and became a priest. According to legend he performed several miracles during his life time, including restoring St Paulinus', his old tutor's sight. The leek is one of the emblems of Wales, and it is said that during a battle with the Saxons, David advised his army to wear leeks in their hats so as to distinguish themselves from the enemy.

David was vegetarian eating only bread, herbs and vegetables; he also only drank water and became known as Aquaticus or Dewi Ddyfrer (the water drinker). He travelled through England and Wales as a missionary and made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem where he was consecrated Bishop. It is

said he founded 12 monasteries including Glastonbury. He was given the title of Archbishop of Wales at the Synod of Brevi (Llandewi Brefi), Cardiganshire in 550.

Life in the monasteries was very strict and hard. The Brothers were expected to survive on very meagre rations of bread and water, plus the physical work of cultivating the land and pulling the plough. Many crafts were undertaken, bee keeping being of particular importance as they had to provide for themselves, travellers and the poor. David died on 1 March 589AD, at Minevia, allegedly over 100 years old. His remains were buried in a shrine in the 6th century cathedral, however this was ransacked in the 11th century by Viking invaders, who plundered the site and murdered two Welsh Bishops.

At his funeral the monastery is said to have been "filled with angels as Christ received his soul". His last words to his followers were in a sermon on the previous Sunday. The Welsh Life of St David gives these as, "Arglwydi, vrodyr, a chwioryd, Bydwch lawen



a chedwch ych ffyd a'ch cret, a gwnewch y petheu bychein a glywyssawch ac a welsawch gennyf i. A mynheu a gerdaf y fford yd aeth an tadeu idi", which translates as, "Lords, brothers and sisters, Be joyful, and keep your faith and your creed, and do the little things that you have seen me do and heard about. And as for me, I will walk the path that our fathers have trod before us." "Do ye the little things in life" ("Gwnewch y pethau bychain mewn bywyd") is today a very well-known phrase in Welsh.

In 1120, Pope Callactus II canonised David as a Saint, following which he was declared Patron Saint of Wales. Fifty churches in South Wales alone bear his name. In 1996 bones were found in St. David's Cathedral which, it is claimed, could be those of Dewi himself.

Today the celebrations usually involve the singing of traditional songs followed by a Te Bach, a tea with bara brith (famous welsh fruited bread) and teisen bach (welsh cake). Children are encouraged to wear national costume and leeks or daffodils are worn, being the national symbols of Wales.

Of course we have the very beautiful St David's Church on the Abergwesyn Road going out of Llanwrtyd. This tiny church has a recorded history of over 1,000 years, but is no doubt much older than that. The site of the church is reputed to have been



chosen much earlier by St David, after the Synod at Llanddewi Brefi in 519. Certainly William Williams Pantycelyn, the famous hymn writer, was the curate here in 1740-42. The church is well worthy of a visit, especially as it has recently had renovation work done and been rededicated by Archbishop John Davies. Plus of course there is the wonderful wood carved statue of St David at the back of the church which is well worth having a look at.

March is a busy month; as it's also **St Patrick's Day**. The Catholic Patron Saint of Ireland's day falls on March 17th. Patrick

brought Christianity to Ireland in the 5th century.

March also brings us **Mothering Sunday** which this year falls on March 22nd, so to all you lovely mums out there 'A Very Happy Mother's Day'.
