Hi everyone

Here we are again with our monthly newsletter, this one for the month of November. Well, it's been somewhat wet recently and chilly too on occasions. I could hardly believe it one morning at the beginning of October when I had to scrape the ice off the car windows before I could go out.

This month I thought I would touch on churches and chapels, of which there are many in this relatively small area. Many were built during the spa heyday so as to provide all visitors with their different religious denominations. Some of these churches and chapels are no longer standing or used for their original purpose, for example in Llanwrtyd alone there was a Zion Baptist Church behind the Neuadd, only a small part of that is still there, and I understand the inside of the chapel was shipped out to America. The Llanwrtyd Congregational Chapel is now the Llanwrtyd & District Heritage & Arts Centre, the Bethesda Calvinistic Methodist Chapel has been sold, I'm sure there are lots more I don't know about.

I saw an article a little while ago about the beautiful 11th century St David's Church (Llanddewi wrth y rhyd) at Llanwrtyd. St David's is dear to my heart because Jonathan and I were married there is 2007, but more recently it has had major renovations including new floors, resetting of the medieval font, and relaying of the porch slab floor at the entrance. The outside walls have had new lime mortar



and a French drain has been made around the church. The building, although it doesn't have electricity or running water, is now wheelchair accessible. The church is in a most beautiful setting and has a very peaceful feel to it; it's a wonderful place for quiet contemplation. A service of rededication was led by Archbishop John Davies who said it was a "privilege to have such a beautiful building in such a beautiful setting".

St James Church in Llanwrtyd Wells is a much younger church being built in 1896. Although the atmosphere in the church is peaceful and it is open for quiet reflection, it is in the centre of this small town and is a focus for the community with a monthly parish lunch, Christmas tree competition and other community activities.

Gosen Calvinistic Methodist Chapel at Cefn Gorwydd was first built in 1741, but has been rebuilt and extended with a date plaque of 1867. It is a fine chapel building with a graveyard behind where many of the graves are of WW1 military personnel.

St Cadmarch Church in Llangammarch Wells is a much newer church being built in 1916 on the site of a previous church. It is built on a hill, so a bit of a pull up the path, but the stunning views of the Epynt, especially on a sunny day, are well worthy of the effort. The inside of the church is very lovely with its impressive inner stonework and oak reredos and lectern.

St Llanlleonfel Church, Garth has had an interesting past; it has been mooted that its original name could have been Llan Lleon Voel translated as 'church upon the bare moor'. Not an easy church to find being hidden by the trees, the site is of Roman origin, the present church dating back to the 17th century although a rough thatched roofed building could have preceded it. Another church which is on a hill, its main claim to fame is a marriage that took place there in 1749; that of Sarah Gwynne, who lived with her family at Garth Hall, and Charles Wesley, the well-known Methodist hymn writer. In the graveyard there are two ancient tombstones believed to be the graves of Welsh princes. There is also a sulphur spring adjacent known as Billy Wern, which would have at the time been an added attraction.

The Victorian church of Eglwys Oen Duw (Church of the Lamb of God) on the road out of Beulah towards Abergwesyn was built by John Norton in 1867 for the private chapel of the Llwynmadoc estate. It is elaborately built in Gothic style, and William Williams (Pantycelyn) had served as Curate there at the beginning of his ministry.

St Afan's church Llanafan Fechan (the lesser) is situated just off the main road between Garth and Cilmery and is accessed through a farm gate. It dates back to the 13th or 14th century but was rebuilt by Charles Buckeridge in 1866. It is the daughter church of St Afan's at Llanafan Fawr (the greater) a few miles away. St Afan was a Celtic Bishop, often known as Afan Buallt, indicating he was from the Builth area. He is thought to have been murdered in a field below the church at Llanafan Fawr.

St Cannen's church Llanganten is based in Cilmery and stands beside the River Chwefri. St Cannen is thought to be the grandson of Brychan Brecheiniog who was the local ruler. It is likely that a church has been on this site from the 6th century, and it was in the graveyard of the church that Prince Llywelyn's body was temporarily laid to rest when he was murdered in 1282. The church was restored in 1880, Then

however the walls are believed to be 17th century or older and the font is believed to be 12th century.

I hope there are some snippets above that you didn't know already, there are so many fascinating things in this area aren't there?
