The month of August

August brings the best bounty of the season, ripened tomatoes, ripe melon, sweet corn on the cob, and courgette are in abundance.

August was named after the first Roman emperor and grandnephew of Julius Caesar, Augustus Caesar (63 B.C. – 14 A.D)

Much of the Month of August information is from the Almanac.com at this link,

- August 1, traditionally known as Lammas Day, was a festival to mark the annual wheat and corn harvest. Lammas also marked the mid-point between the summer solstice and autumn equinox, and was a cross-quarter day.
- August 1 is a Civic Holiday in many parts of Canada. Celebrations and names for this holiday vary across the country. For example, in Alberta, it's celebrated as Heritage Day, while in British Columbia, it's known as British Columbia Day!
- August 10 is St. Lawrence's Day. "Fair weather on St. Lawrence's Day presages a fair autumn."
- August 11 marks the end of the Dog Days of Summer, which began on July 3.
- August 17 is when the Cat Nights begin, harking back to a rather obscure Irish legend concerning witches; this bit of folklore also led to the idea that a cat has nine lives.
- August 19 brings National Aviation Day, chosen for the birthday of Orville Wright who piloted the first recorded flight of a powered heavier-than-air machine in 1903.
- August 20 World Honeybee Day
- August 24 is St. Bartholomew Day. "At St. Bartholomew, there comes cold dew."
- August 25 Kiss-and-Make-Up Day
- August 26 is Women's Equality Day, which celebrates the 1920 ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment and, with it, women's right to vote in the United States.

August Super moon

August's full Sturgeon Moon, reaches peak illumination on the night of Thursday, August 11. It's also the final Super-moon of 2022.

August is also a wonderful month for star gazing! It's the month of the Perseid meteor shower, which is one of the most prolific showers and reaches its maximum between August 11 and 13. This year, however, the best of the Perseids occurs at the same time as the full Moon, which means that the Moon's brightness will likely wash out many of the "falling stars!"

Luckily, you can still see the Perseids even if they're not at their peak. The shower lasts from about July 23 to August 22, so for the best chance of catching the Perseids, keep an eye out in early August or around the 20th.

The zodiac signs for August is Leo until the 22nd and Virgo thereafter.

August Birth Flowers

August's bright, showy flowers capture the essence of sunny, late summer days!

The gladiolus, or 'sword lily,' signifies strength of character, sincerity, generosity, remembrance, calm, integrity, and infatuation. Gladiolus also indicates that the heart is being "pierced with love."

The other August flower is the poppy: A red poppy signifies pleasure; a white poppy is given for consolation; and, a yellow poppy wishes wealth and success.

August Birthstone



August's birthstone is the Peridot, sometimes called Evening Emerald, which is said to symbolize strength and healing power, protecting its wearer from nightmares and evil, ensuring harmony and happiness. Babies born in August are lucky to be guarded by Peridot's good fortune.

Peridot is the rare gem-quality form of the mineral olivine that appears in various shades of green, sometimes with a brown or yellow tinge. Peridot is formed deep inside the earth's mantle and is brought to the surface by volcanoes. In Hawaii, Peridot symbolizes the tears of Pele, the volcano goddess of fire who controls the flow of lava.

A previous birthstone for this month was Sardonyx, which is characterized by alternating bands of Sard and Onyx, both forms of Chalcedony. Although it can appear in several colours, it is usually reddish and white. It is thought to bring courage, happiness, and eloquence.

Legend says that Queen Elizabeth 1 once gave the Earl of Essex a ring made of Sardonyx, pledging her aid if he was ever in need. Later on, when accused of treason and scheduled for execution, he tried to send the ring to her but an enemy intercepted it. The queen learned of his plea only years later, after he had been beheaded.

With these recent requests becoming more frequent, we have decided to "adopt" Llandrindod Wells into LWCT. While we are doing this on a relatively small scale, we need to recruit a few Volunteer Drivers in the Llandrindod area to make this a more affordable and sustainable project and may look to expand this over the coming months if it proves popular.

Having a dedicated team of volunteer drivers in the area that will be supported by our existing volunteers and office staff, will enable us to have a bespoke service which we hope will become as popular as our current services in the Llanwrtyd Wells areas. Like the scheme in Llanwrtyd Wells, the Llandrindod Wells division will be offering one to one car journeys for those needing to access medical appointments, shopping, and any other essential and social journeys.

Local Celebrity

My name is Natalie Powell. I am a Judoka and I compete for Wales and Great Britain. I currently live between Wales and the Netherlands. I come from Beulah and started judo at Irfon Judo Club in Builth Wells when I was 8 years old. As a child I enjoyed a range of sports; netball, athletics and tennis in particular. I was incredibly fortunate to have parents who enjoyed and were in a position to take me around the country to competitions and camps. Being from mid-wales and getting into elite

sport is particularly difficult logistically.

I moved to Cardiff at 18 to study Biomedical Science at Cardiff University. At which time I started judo training as much as I could at the Welsh National centre. I won Junior Nationals for the first time in my last junior year. But it wasn't until 3 years later I got selected for my first European Championships (U23).



I've been very fortunate to have had some incredible moments in my career. A couple of my favourites were winning a World Championship medal in 2017 in Budapest and later that year topping the World Ranking list and becoming World Ranked No1.

Qualifying for 2 Olympic Games in the World Top 8 is something I am very proud of, but at the same time, not fulfilling my dream of getting an Olympic medal on either occasion has been the most difficult part of my career to deal with. Giving everything to something and falling short really hurts.



I am currently preparing for the Commonwealth Games on the 3rd August. I recently returned from a week's training in Porec and will be following up with camps in Alicante and Germany to prepare. I won the Commonwealth Games for Wales back in 2014 and will be aiming to retain my title as it's something no-one in judo has previously done. So it's a very exciting time ahead and I'm really looking forward to the challenge.

Soar y Mynydd English: (Zour of the Mountain) Calvinistic Methodist chapel

Soar y Mynydd chapel has reopened after the Covid-19 pandemic, and also marks its 200th anniversary this year. It's a bit of a trek on a long and winding mountain road to find what is regarded as the most remote chapel in Wales. The chapel is surrounded by hills dotted with sheep and red kites that hang in the skies above the



whitewashed building, nine miles from the nearest town. Soar y Mynydd was built in 1822 between Tregaron and Llyn Brianne to service the neighbouring farms in the Cambrian Mountains. It was also used by the drovers as they moved sheep from Tregaron

toward the markets of London.

"Some people may think we're in the middle of nowhere but, when you look at it, this place has been in existence for thousands of years as a spiritual centre for the whole of Wales," said Cyril Evans, chairman of Tregaron and District Historical Society.

"If you look at the peaks of some of the mountains and the hills in the area you'll find which cairns denote burial "You grounds. have also standing stones



in the area and, of course, we're just a stone's throw away from the site of Strata Florida Abbey (Latin for Vale of Flowers) which was built in 1201 and is as spiritual as you can get in mid Wales."

Getting to the chapel is a hairy ride along a single track road that weaves and winds through the Welsh hinterland, however once you arrive, it is a peaceful place. There are no distractions, no electricity, no mobile phone signal. There's no heating here either. You are cut off from the outside world.



The chapel is closed over the winter as harsh weather conditions make it difficult to reach, but it's a different story during the summer months. with visitors arriving from all over the world.

The simple building is made of local rubble stone and whitewashed, with a slate roof. Inside, one of the most prominent features is the painted scroll above the pulpit reading Duw cariad yw/God is love.

Chapel secretary Lynwen Hughes has followed in the footsteps of her ancestors who looked after it. "I believe my family have been involved with the chapel for years and years, since the beginning, as my family have always lived in this area," she said. "My great-grandfather was the chapel's deacon for 50 years. In the 1970s, my uncle restarted the chapel with the help of others".

For a chapel celebrating 200 years of existence there's surprisingly little maintenance work to be done, although it's repainted annually. "One of my duties is to arrange preachers for the Sundays, and also keep the place clean and tidy," she said. "The family come up before the start of the services in May. We come up for an afternoon and clean the chapel. We're very, happy to reopen and to get back to some kind of normality," she said.
